PAPER

What to Recycle

- Newspapers
- White & Colored Office Paper
- Magazines and Catalogs
- Junk Mail
- Envelopes with and without windows
- Cereal and frozen food boxes
- Hard and soft cover books
- Brown paper bags
- Paper cup sleeves
- Shredded paper

What NOT to Recycle

- NO Paper Plates or Cups
- NO Tissues or Napkins
- NO Backing from Labels
- NO Shipping Envelopes
- NO Photographs

Cardboard

Corrugated cardboard must be flattened and placed next to paper recycling bins

PLASTIC, GLASS, & CANS



What to Recycle

- Any numbered plastic bottles and containers
- Aluminum cans
- Glass bottles and jars
- Milk and juice cartons/jugs
- Aerosol cans

What NOT to Recycle

- NO plastic utensils*
- No Styrofoam
- No ceramics or Pyrex
- No stained glass
- No plastic bags
- No plastic films

*Plastic utensils can be recycled if relatively clean.

SPECIALTY RECYCLING

E-Waste

E-Waste is defined as material having electronic components, such as computer boards, digital displays, or microchips. E-waste includes:

- Cell phones
- Cameras
- Laptops
- iPods
- Ink cartridges



Batteries and Other Hazardous Items

Batteries and other items deemed as hazardous must be handled by the Environmental Health and Safety Department.
